MESSAGE FROM BIPUL CHANDRA SAHA, NATIONAL DIRECTOR FOR RSETIS

RSETIs and RUDSETIs could resume normal functioning during the Financial Year 2022-23 after facing difficulties of COVID-19 during two consecutive years 2020-21 & 2021-22. All our RSETIs/RUDSETIs have shown their solidarity towards the objectives of the RSETI movement and performed exceedingly well with regard to the number of candidates trained, settled and Credit linked during FY 2022-23. As on 31.03.2023, there are 590 RSETIs/ RUDSETIs covering 572 Districts, functioning across the country under the aegis of Ministry of Rural Development (MoRD), Govt. of India, which are sponsored by 24 Banks. All these RSETIs/ RUDSETIs are providing training to the Rural unemployed youth in 59 NSQF aligned courses and 5 MoRD approved courses. The performance highlights of the RSETIs during FY 2022-23 are as under:



- ❖ As against the Annual Target of 4.04 lakh candidates, RSETIs have totally trained 4.10 lakh candidates (Achievement being 101%), of which 3.26 lakh candidates settled (80%) and 1.93 lakh candidates have settled with Credit linkage (60%).
- ❖ RSETIs are giving priority to mobilize a greater number of rural poor unemployed youth to give training according to their requirement. Thus, out of the total trained, the share of Rural Poor trained is 3.38 lakh (82%), of which 2.67 lakh candidates have settled (79%) and 1.75 lakh have settled with Credit Linkage (62%).
- ❖ In tune with the objectives of GOI, the RSETIs/RUDSETIs are giving more emphasis for women empowerment. Thus, out of total trained, the share of women candidates trained is 3.32 lakh (81%), of which 2.73 lakh candidates have settled (82%) and 1.75 lakh women candidates settled with credit linkage (65%).

I convey my sincere thanks to the Directors, Faculties and Office Assistants (OAs) of the RSETIs/ RUDSETIs for their relentless support which has made this achievement possible.

Further, we have done a notable improvement in reconciliation and realization of pending claims during the FY 2022-23 and because of the collective efforts of the RSETIs and sponsoring Banks along with the active involvement of the State Directors (SDRs), who have made huge efforts to reconcile the data with the respective Banks and SRLMs. I am pleased to inform you that the MoRD has released Rs.187.02 Crore to various states during FY 2022-23, towards settlement of the pending claims. This is the first time in the history of the RSETIs that such a big amount is released in a particular Financial Year.

Another important milestone achievement during FY 2022-23 is that the SDRs in coordination with the sponsored Banks and NIRDPR have made major get through in the matter of construction of RSETI buildings. Thus, during the year many RSETIs have shifted to own buildings, in many cases the stopped building construction was resumed, in many cases building construction was commenced, in many cases land has been allocated. I am confident that with the same tempo, the quality of the training will be greatly improved with the shifting of many more RSETIs to own building during the FY 2023-24 also.

We had also worked for improving the Quality of training by conducting ToT programmes in various States for engaging the Domain Skill Trainers (DSTs) so that the shortage of Certified Trainers is fulfilled for ensuring quality training.

The grading and CNN compliance status of RSETIs has been improved gradually and during the year 2021-22, 560 RSETIs have secured AA Grade and 566 RSETIs have complied with CNN. Definitely this credit also goes to the RSETI Directors, Faculties, OAs and SDRs.

I am happy to learn that your RSETI is publishing Annual Activity Report-2022-23. On this occasion, I want to congratulate the Director, Faculties & other staff members and convey my sincere thanks to all for the performance during FY 2022-23. I am confident that your RSETI will excel performance during FY 2023-24 also.

PREAMBLE

Swami Vivekananda visualised a regenerated India through blending of oriental spirituality with occidental science and technology. He said that the aim of education must be to solve the problems of life. In his view education is all round development of physical, intellectual, moral and spiritual values. His greatest contribution was to open the minds of individuals to their duty to the downtrodden masses. He fought to revive the spirit of humanism in education. In his view education is not identical with information. He said education should lay proper emphasis on creativity, originality and excellence. With this mission in mind “Ramakrishna Mission Samaj Sevak Sikshan Mandir” started its maiden journey in the year 1986 under the aegis of Ramakrishna Mission Saradapitha, a branch centre of Ramakrishna Mission, Belur Math, Howrah, West Bengal. In the same year the flagship programme of the institute – 10 month long free residential course viz. “Rural Entrepreneurship Development Programme (REDP)” was launched with the following objectives:

OBJECTIVES & CHARACTERISTICS

- ❖ To develop human resources in the rural India and to improve the socio-economic condition of its people through skill development and income generation.
- ❖ To upgrade the traditional knowledge and skill of the farmers and the rural artisans in the light of continuous research and development in the national and international level.
- ❖ To create scientific temperament amongst the rural folks and an eagerness to adopt new technology and innovation.
- ❖ To build character on the basis of higher truths of spirituality and value education as character building was fundamental in Vivekananda's concept of education.
- ❖ To instil confidence and determination in the minds of trainees.
- ❖ Generate self-confidence & determination in the minds of trainees so that they can venture to float new enterprises for self-employment at their respective villages after completing the training.



IMPORTANT MOVEMENTS IN THE HISTORY OF THIS INSTITUTE

- ❖ In the year 2007-08 (17 March 2008) the institute entered into a tie-up arrangement with UBI (United Bank of India) and NABARD (National Bank for Agriculture & Rural Development) to function as a RUDSETI (Rural Development & Self Employment Training Institute) type institute for conducting various skill development training programmes on equal cost sharing basis.
- ❖ The RSETI in its new form continued with the REDP (Rural Entrepreneurship Development Programme), the flagship training programme of 10 months' duration. Subsequently, it introduced various SDI (Skill Development Initiative) programmes of short duration, aiming at skill development and income generation. These were mainly held at the sub-centres scattered over various districts of West Bengal. SDI programmes are generally non-residential and held on various trades in farm & non-farm sector sponsored by NABARD / Govt. of West Bengal / Govt. of India etc.



- ❖ During the course of its long journey some events of 2011-12 and 2012-13 deserves special mention. On the basis of its performance during 2011-12 the institute earned “A” grade and on the performance of 2012-13 ranked 3rd best RSETI amongst all the RSETIs in India by NAR (National Academy of RUDSETI) under the aegis of Ministry of Rural Development (MoRD), Govt. of India.
- ❖ The Institute continues to enjoy “AA” grade status for the last several years. Several other short term training programmes are sponsored separately by DRDC, NABARD, West Bengal Swarojgar Corporation Ltd. (WBSCL), Coconut Development Board (CDB), Govt. of India; Hindalco Industries Ltd etc.

- ❖ Short duration courses (ranging from 80 hours to 480 hours) on various income generating trades
- ❖ EDP oriented training modules as per the norms set by NAR (National Academy of RUDSETI)
- ❖ Full-edged infrastructural facilities arranged including demonstrative units of various trades
- ❖ EDP inputs as per course module given by NAR
- ❖ Starting the day with Prayer followed by Yoga class, Shramdan and presentation of MILLY (Most Important Lessons Learnt Yesterday) by the trainees
- ❖ Writing training log on day-to-day basis
- ❖ Prepared Post Programme Report (Appendix 23) & Post Training Evaluation (Appendix 25)
- ❖ Guiding trainees on preparation of project report for getting bank loan after successful completion of the training



IMPROVISATION ADOPTED

- ❖ Training programmes and training schedules are drawn as per NAR's (National Academy of RUDSETI) course module
- ❖ Prescribed training kits are used in all skill training programmes
- ❖ Micro Lab - Ice breaking & rapport building exercises are done at the beginning of all training programmes to help the trainees know each other intimately
- ❖ AMT (Achievement Motivation Training) manual in Bengali version introduced & followed
- ❖ MILLY made compulsory
- ❖ Inviting successful entrepreneurs for sharing of their experiences with the subsequent batches
- ❖ Behavioural games played to get insight into the individual psyche and to reveal among other things his attitudes & values
- ❖ Introduction of MIS based record keeping
- ❖ Maintenance of ex-trainees' database & improving the quality of follow-up action
- ❖ Maintenance of settlement register, training log, attendant register, visitor's books etc.



SPECIAL STATUS

The Department of Agriculture, Govt. of West Bengal has recognised Ramakrishna Mission Samaj Sevak Sikshan Mandir as a resource centre for training of Farmers' and is sponsoring different training programmes for the farmers hailing from different districts of the states.

INFRASTRUCTURE

The gradually built-up three storied magnificent RSETI building named VB with 10000 Sq. ft. covered area was formally inaugurated in the year 2011 coinciding with the Silver Jubilee Celebration of the institute. The RSETI is spread over vast area of manicured garden & greenery. The milieu is ideal for learning & concentration.

The building is having number of spacious class rooms, office room, staff room, principal's office & living room. This apart, there is dormitory for the trainees, guest rooms, meeting and counselling room, conference hall, computer lab, library etc. There is a number of toilet blocks and long widening corridors. At present residential training of more than 100 trainees can be organised simultaneously at the institute. The institute is thankful to the Dept. of Agriculture, Govt. of W.B for providing grant-assistance for construction of the new building under RKVY (Rastriya Krishi Vikash Yojana).

SOLAR POWER PLANT

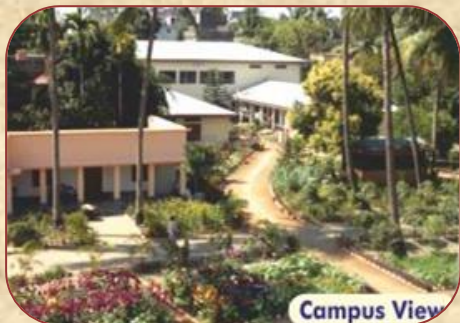

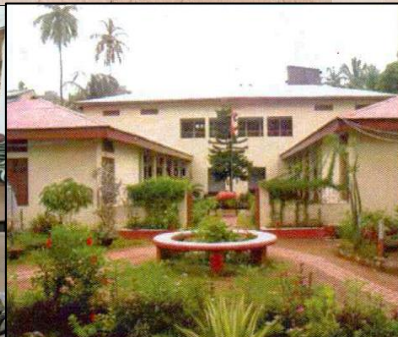

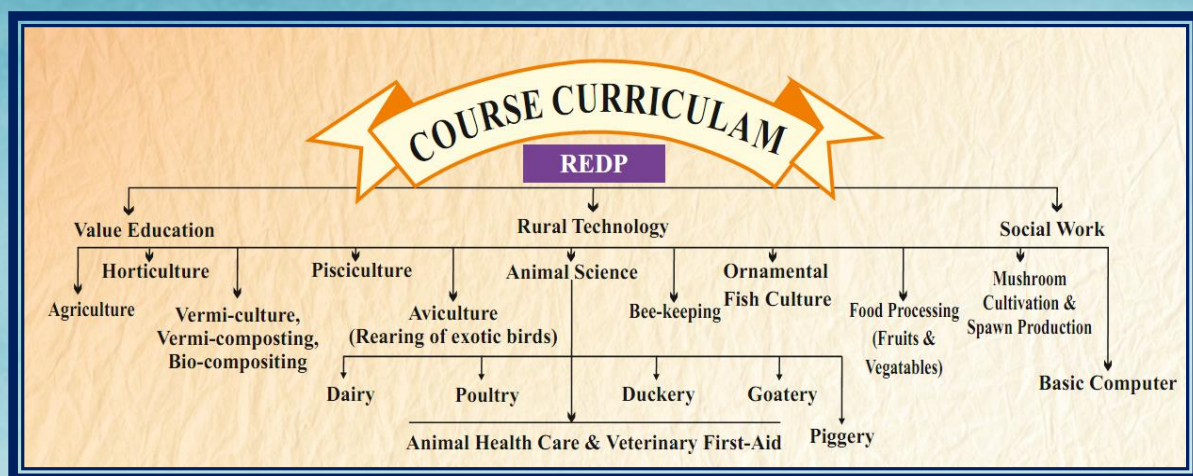

TRAINING COURSES

- a) REDP (Rural Entrepreneurship Development Programme) the flagship training programme of the institute is being conducted uninterruptedly since its introduction in the year 1986. This is a free residential comprehensive training of 10 months' duration given to 40 odd unemployed male students hailing from rural Bengal purely on the basis of merit irrespective of their caste, creed and religion.
- b) Apart from this programme, various short duration EDP and other in-campus & off-campus specified training courses on various trades under both farm & non-farm sectors are conducted. Detailed course programmes are categorised hereinafter.



ADMISSION PROCEDURE

The intending candidates are to apply against newspaper / website advertisement of the Institute. Those fulfilling the admission criterion are short listed for admission after written test & personal interview.

DAILY ROUTINE FOLLOWED IN THE INSTITUTE

The day starts at 5-00 am in the morning and ends at 10-00 pm. seemingly, this is a rigorous schedule but made enjoyable through combination of training & reaction. Two times Prayer, in a morning and evening, “Shramdan” for up-keeping the wide-spread campus clean and habitable, on-the-job training in the agricultural field adjoining the institute, physical exercise in the gymnasium, musical class, outdoor games – all these forms the essential fabric of the daily routine besides theoretical classes. With each passing day of the training course - the trainees feel a unique bond with the institute and they themselves voluntarily come forward at its every call even years after their passing out.

COURSE COVERAGE

Training disciplines, inter alia, include Agri-Horticultural practices, Sericulture, Poultry, Duck Rearing, Pisciculture including Ornamental Fish Cultivation, Animal Husbandry & Animal Health Care, Apiculture, Aviculture, Mushroom Cultivation & Spawn culture, Vermi-culture & Vermi-composting, Food Processing etc. along with Environment & Sanitation, Primary Health Care, Agricultural Extension, Entrepreneurship Development, Social Studies, Organisation Building, Basic Computer and Value education. Training curriculum includes both in-house training and field exposure. Apart from all these, the trainees are given lessons on importance of financial literacy, financial awareness and elementary Banking.



HIGHLIGHTS OF ACTIVITIES

SUBJECT SPECIFIC FOCUS :

AGRICULTURE

Agronomical crops, Agriculture with Soil Fertility & Soil Testing Procedure, Quality Seed Production, Integrated Plant Nutrient Management, Integrated Pest Management, Watershed Management etc.

HORTICULTURE

Fruit Crop, Pomology, Floriculture and Olericulture, horticultural nursery etc.

ANIMAL HUSBANDRY

Animal Husbandry and Animal Health Care including Dairy, Goatery, Poultry, Duckery, Veterinary First-aid etc. are given due weightage considering their importance in rural economy and generation of self-employment.



FOOD PROCESSING

The Institute's training-cum-production unit on food processing is used for training on Processing and Preservation of fruits & vegetables (Various Types of Jam, Jelly, Pickles, Squash, Tomato Ketchup, Chilli Sauce, Honey, Amlaprash, Papad etc.). The unit is having state

of the art machineries and appliances.

PISCICULTURE

Cultivation of Indian Major Carps and other species of fish. Inland Fishery includes hatching, farm made fish breeding & seed management nursing, rearing and induced fish breeding, occupies an important role in the training curricula.

COMPOSTING (VERMI, BIO, SUPER ETC.)

The trainees are actively involved in preparation of Bio-Composting, which includes Super-Compost, Azolla, Vermi-compost as-well-as preservation and multiplication of suitable species of earthworms by utilising the compost pits specially constructed for this purpose within the premises of the Institute. Bacteria are also used for composting.

AVICULTURE & CONSERVATION OF BIRDS (EXOTIC)

Keeping in view the emergence of Aviculture (rearing & breeding of exotic birds only) as an important field of entrepreneurship and also the importance of conservation of exotic birds, practical training along with theoretical classes are arranged in the Aviary and class room at the institute premises.



ORNAMENTAL FISH CULTURE

Cultivation and multiplication of different types of Ornamental Fishes including its management practices have been incorporated in the course curriculum. This has emerged as a sure avenue of income generation for the trainees.



APICULTURE / BEE KEEPING

Honey-bees not only provide honey and wax but they also greatly contribute towards pollinating the insect-pollinated crops and thereby help in increasing agricultural production. Scientific Bee-keeping methodology in bee boxes along with its proper management round the year is taught to the trainees to help them understand how Bees help the bee-keepers & the farmers.



MUSHROOM CULTIVATION

During the training the trainees are taught about the cultivation and other management practices of different species of mushroom. With an object to providing quality mushroom spawn (seed) to the ex-trainees a laboratory for production of mushroom spawn has been established at the institute which effectively caters to the need of mushroom spawn of the ex-trainees in their start-up ventures.



DUCKERY

A Duckery unit is maintained inside the campus where 25 number of ducks of “Chara Chameli” & Khaki Campbell species have been reared.

POULTRY

The unit is enriched with the various varieties of birds received from farms owned by Government of West Bengal as gift. These birds are used for the purpose of Poultry training.



PIGGERY

Pig farming is a promoting venture to support the economic status, the subject has been included in the training course. The theoretical aspect is being done in-campus while practical is done in Haringhata Dairy Farm during farm placement for a month.

GOATERY

Goat farming is an important avenue to generate income. Theory and practical is done at Haringhata Dairy Farm despite detail theory at campus.

SELECTION & FORMAL INAUGURATION OF 37TH BATCH OF REDP COURSE

Selection camp for REDP (Rural Entrepreneurship Development Programme) Course 2022-23 was held on 6 & 7 May 2022. Out of 107 applicants, 74 candidates attended the camp from which 40 candidates were selected and 23 candidates were waitlisted.

The 37th session of the Rural Entrepreneurship Development Programme (REDP) of the institute started on 15 May 2022 with 35 candidates hailing from the rural areas of 15 districts of West Bengal. Formal inauguration was held on 28 May



2022. Swami Devarajananda, Convener, Ramakrishna Vivekananda Bhava Prachar Parishad, Belur Math; Swami Shastrajnananda, Secretary, Ramakrishna Mission Saradapitha; Swami Shivakarananda, Principal of this Institute; Shri Santosh Kumar Bharti, DGM & Circle Head, PNB, Kolkata West Circle; Dr Swapan Kumar Nandi, SDR, West Bengal and other dignitaries were present on the occasion.

INSTITUTIONAL PLACEMENT / STUDY TOUR

During the period under review the trainees of the 37th REDP batch were placed to different Govt. farms for undergoing hands-on training in various aspects of agriculture and allied activities like Induced Breeding in Fish, Dairy Management, Animal Health Care, Poultry, Piggery, Goat Rearing, Duck Rearing etc. as per the details given hereunder :

- a) Six day's fishery training camp from July 01 – 06, 2022 at the Central Institute of Freshwater Aquaculture, ICAR, Rahara where they underwent intensive field training on Induced Breeding of Fish and Seed Management.
- b) One month long training camp from December 15, 2022 at Haringhata Farm, Kalyani, under Animal Resource Development Department, Govt. of West Bengal, where they are undergoing intensive practical training on Dairy Management, Animal Health Care, Poultry, Piggery, Goatery, Duckery etc.
- c) Six day's long training camp from February 06 – 11, 2022 at Agricultural Training Centre (ATC), Chinsurah, Hooghly where they underwent intensive Agri-Horticultural training practices. This placement compensates to a large extent the absence of any agricultural farm at our campus.

From the very beginning of the REDP training course, the trainees were taken to Kamarpukur (Hooghly District), Jayrambati & Koalpara (Bankura District) to visit some places which are intimately associated with the secret memories of Sri Ramakrishna Dev and Holy Mother Shree Shree Sarada Devi. The trainees also visited the soil testing laboratory and observed some other activities of Pallimangal, the rural development units of Ramakrishna Mission Kamarpukur and Jayrambati.

The 33rd Ex-trainees Conference was inaugurated at 9.30 a.m. on March 15, 2023 by Swami Satyeshananda, Asst. SKILL DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVE (SDI) TRAINING PROGRAMME

As per norms & methodology stipulated by the Ministry of Rural Development (MoRD), Govt. of India & NAR (National Academy of RUDSETI) there is various short duration training programme on Farm & Non-farm sectors conducted within and outside the campus of the RSETI.

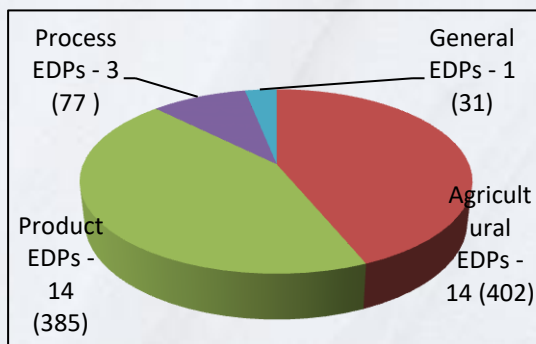

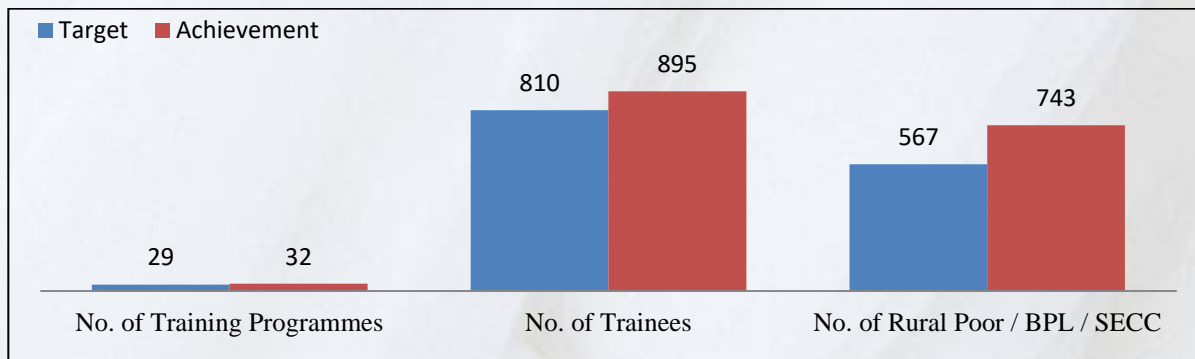

ANNUAL GRADING

Annual Grading exercise of the activities conducted during the financial year 2022-23 was held on July 05, 2023. A team comprising of Mr. Chhabila Bhoi, Director of SBI RSETI Kalahandi, Odisha; Shri Manish Kumar Ranjan, Chief Manager (Nodal Officer), Punjab National Bank, Kolkata (West) Circle; Shri M. K. Soni, LDM, UCO Bank, Howrah and the Principal / Director, RKMSSSM evaluated the functioning of the RSETI for the FY 2021-22. Mr. Chhabila Bhoi acted as Grading Officer & representative of MoRD and NACER. After detailed examination of the books & records and also inspection of physical infrastructure this year also RKMSSSM secured ‘AA’ grade in the final assessment.

TAILORING TRAINING AT HOOGHLY CENTRAL CORRECTIONAL HOME

We are organising Tailoring training in a batch size of 10-15 inmates of Hooghly Central Correctional Home, Chinsuraha every three months. We have engaged a trainer against payment of monthly remuneration of Rs.3000/-. The feedback against this training programme is quite encouraging.

VILLAGE ADOPTION PROGRAMME

Through more than 35 Sub-centres spread across twelve districts of West Bengal we are carrying on various types of educational and social activities. Primary School is run in most of our sub-centres for the benefit of the children living nearby. Free dispensary is run on specified days in the sub-centres. Stress is also laid on the preventive health care and sanitation. Villagers are made aware of the benefits of various immunisation & vaccination programmes of the government and local bodies. Our sub-centres are working towards empowerment of women, they are arranging various types of capacity building training programmes for the local women. Our sub-centres are helping in formation of Self Help Groups. Farmers are made aware of the improved methods of cultivation and advent of new technology. They are also made aware of the various welfare schemes of the government. Patha-chakra (religious discourse) is held in the evening on specified days at our sub-centres on regular basis. Our sub-centres also conduct relief measures in the form of providing shelter & food to the affected local people during natural disaster like cyclone, flood etc.

We have established a free coaching centre and a tube well for drinking water for the villagers located in and around Aharrah Vivekananda Yuba Sangha, Arsha, Purulia with the financial help of Ramakrishna Mission Saradapitha, Belur Math under community development scheme on the occasion of 125th Anniversary of the Foundation Day of Ramakrishna Mission. We also conducted a special training on Beauty Parlour Management for rural women's and 101 blankets were distributed to the poor villagers.



FINANCIAL LITERACY & CREDIT COUNSELING CENTRE (FLCC)

From the very beginning the FLC at Belur Math, formed under the sponsorship of erstwhile United Bank of India did a splendid job in implementing RBI's plan on Financial Inclusion. It spread the message of financial literacy amongst cross section of the society. In all the RSETI training programme at our centre here a class on financial literacy was taken by the Financial Literacy Counselor. In all the training programme conducted at our sub-centres spread across 13 districts, a class on Financial Literacy was taken by the Financial Literacy Counselor. These apart, FLC held several outreach programme on Financial Literacy at the different centres at its own initiatives in league with RBI, Kolkata.

But after the 1st quarter in 2021, the FLC centre at Belur Math became non-functional due to the absence of any FLC Counselor. The matter has already been brought into the notice of the present sponsor bank, the Punjab National Bank.



INTERNATIONAL DAY OF YOGA

Our trainees have participated in the 8th countdown of International Yoga Day on 14 June 2022 from 7-00 am to 8-00 am conducted by NACER through video conference and the 8th International Day of Yoga was observed on 21 June 2022 at our seminar hall from 6-00 am to 7-00 am where 34 trainees & 3 staffs had participated.

POST-TRAINING SUPPORT SERVICE

Staying together for 10 months in a fully residential programme creates a very close bonding between the trainees and the institution. This makes regular interaction amongst the ex-trainees much easier. Ex-trainees love to maintain close contact with the Institute and this facilitates extending of all possible post-training support services to them. They visit the institute as and when required and consult the specialist faculties on different subjects regarding various problems encountered by them in implementing their projects. Conversely, the resource persons pay occasional visit to the project sites set up by the trainees. Close liaison with the ex-trainees result in better credit linkage with the banks since many veteran bankers render volunteer service at our institute.

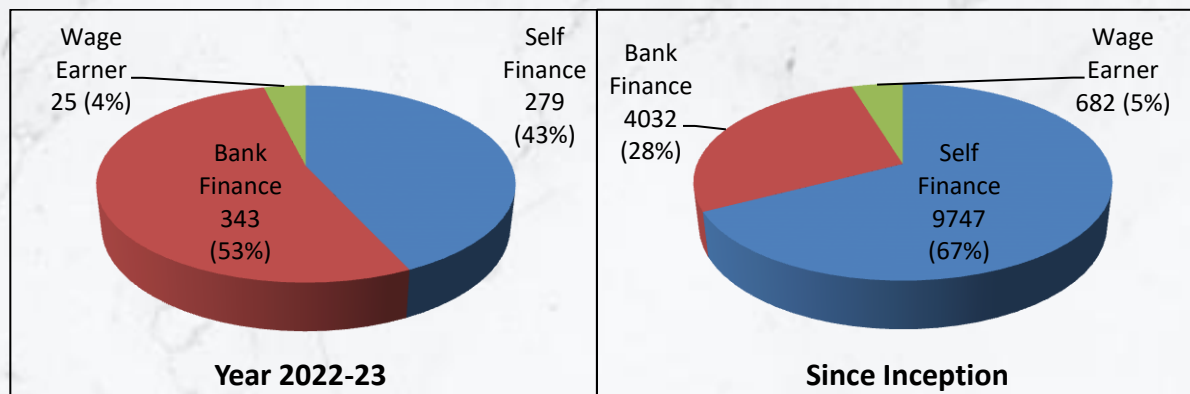
FOLLOW-UP

- Personal contact is being maintained with the ex-trainees to provide constant guidance to them in pursuing their vocation. The trainees are assisted in preparation of project proposals and filling of application forms for availing credit support from banks.
- During the year under review 1531 candidates under Agricultural EDPs, Products EDPs, Process EDPs and General EDPs were followed-up during 189 numbers of visits. Such hand holding continues for 2 years after the training.
- Appendix-25 (format of quarterly report – post training evaluation) for the quarter ending June 2022, September 2022, December 2022 & March 2023 was prepared.
- Follow-up programme has been further improved through MIS data base system.

SETTLEMENT DURING FY 2022-23

Out of the 895 number of trainees trained during the FY, 343 trainees have set up their units with own funds, 279 trainees availed loans like KCC, SHGs and another 25 trainees are presently employed in different organisations and the settlement of the rest is in progress.

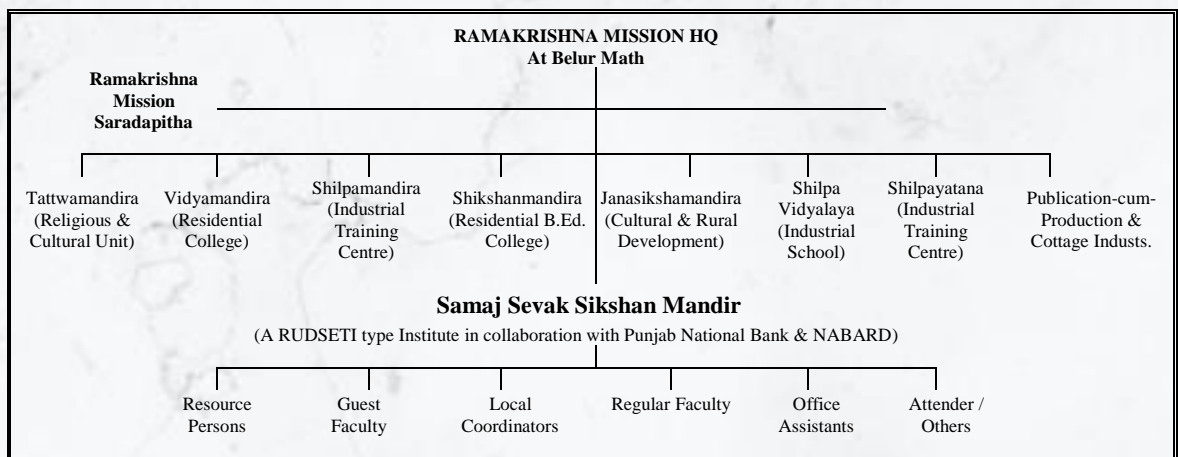

SUCCESS STORIES

Shri Tamal Mondal is a young man with lots of enthusiasm and ambition. After completing school education he was looking for a profession to pursue. He had a knack towards mobile phone repairing. Working under a cell phone mechanic and gathering rudimentary knowledge from various training literature and video available in the internet Shri Mondal acquired certain degree of competence and started cell phone repairing business from his residence. His sincerity and focus on success brought him many customers and within a short span his monthly income was to the level of Rs.8,000/- to Rs.9000/- per month.

Since he is an enterprising young man he was not satisfied with his present level of income. At this juncture he got the information from one of his acquaintance that Nabagram Swami Vivekananda Sevashrama a sub-centre of Ramakrishna Mission Samaj Sevak Sikshan Mandir, Belur Math, Howrah is going to conduct a 60 days intensive training on cell phone repairing at their premises during June – August 2022. Shri Mondal readily enrolled himself in the upcoming training programme in the Awareness camp held few days earlier from the commencement of the training.



He had attended the training programme and got remove all his confusion and misgiving. After the training he emerged as a complete cell phone mechanic and started doing his business successfully. His net monthly income after training rose to Rs.15,000/- per month. He has obtained a PMEGP loan from Bank of India, Kalinagar Branch to the tune of Rs.5,60,000/-. His own investment in the business amounts to Rs.1,20,000/-.

As a prudent person he has diversified his cell phone repairing business to sale mobile phones and all kinds of accessories. He is selling quality gift items also. He has installed photo copy machine, computers, printers etc. He has engaged one local boy as his helper. From his statement and available records, the loan account is still running satisfactorily.

He lives in a small family comprising his wife and parents. His father is looking after their agricultural land and cultivation of paddy etc. From every aspect he is to be regarded as a successful entrepreneur with lots of prospect and possibility.

SUCCESS STORIES

Smt. Rupali Mal is a young widow who is struggling to find a stable source of income to meet the increasing cost of living of the family, specially the educational expenses of her only son who is now reading in the 10th standard in school. Apart from her son, her mother-in-law is also living with her. Being a typical village woman she never thought of carrying on any business on her own to meet the household expenses but the sudden death of her husband after few days of illness shook her world. And now she was forced to think of earning honestly through some business or profession. At this point of time one of her acquaintance informed her about a tailoring training programme to be conducted at Belpukur Sree Sree Ramakrishna Vivekananda Pathachakra, Shyampur – a sub-centre of Ramakrishna Mission Samaj Sevak Sikshan Mandir, Belur Math, Howrah mainly for the SHG women. Her pre-training monthly income of Rs.3000/- per month.



At this point of time one of her acquaintance informed her about a tailoring training programme to be conducted at Belpukur Sree Sree Ramakrishna Vivekananda Pathachakra, Shyampur – a sub-centre of Ramakrishna Mission Samaj Sevak Sikshan Mandir, Belur Math, Howrah mainly for the SHG women. Her pre-training monthly income of Rs.3000/- per month.

Smt Rupali quickly contacted the organizer of the training programme and got herself enrolled. It was a 60 days programme. She had attended the programme very sincerely and took keen interest in it. She had some rudimentary knowledge in womens' tailoring beforehand. The training she received honed her existing skills and added many new areas. Like how to take exact measurement, precise cutting of cloth, ideal type of stitching etc.

She learnt lot many things about the present fashion and styles in ladies tailoring. She also discovered where from the basic raw materials and other accessories could be procured at a competitive price. She also got a fair idea about the possibilities of acquiring bulk orders and the best way of marketing her produce.

Her skills and sincerity has earned her some goodwill and she is getting orders from the women of her village and nearby villages also. She is mainly focusing on making of blouse, churidar, saya etc. Now, her monthly income varies in the region Rs.6000/- - Rs.8000/- per month which is a quantum jump from her pre-training monthly income of Rs.3000/-.

She has invested around Rs.10,000/- from her personal sources and obtained a loan of Rs.20,000/- from her SHG group. Her family is having some cultivable land where paddy is grown. This is looked after by her mother-in-law. Of late she had some health issues from which she is getting out fast and hopefully this will result in upward trend in her monthly income. She is a prospective entrepreneur and it is only a matter of time that she will emerge as a successful business woman.
